DECLARATION OF LOCAL DISASTER – CRITTENBERGER FIRE AND CRITICAL WILDFIRE HAZARDS (AMENDMENT 1)

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Coryell County, in accordance with provisions of the Texas Disaster Act of 1975(418.108 Texas Government Code); declared a state of local disaster on April 12, 2022, due to the Crittenberger Complex Fire and the existing severe drought conditions; and,

WHEREAS, the Crittenberger Complex Fire and other local wildfires have taken an extreme toll on the availability and readiness of our paid and volunteer fire departments, and

WHEREAS, the Keetch-Byram Drought Index ('KBDI'), maintained by Texas A&M Agrilife Research and Texas A&M Forest Service, is an index that is used to determine fire potential and the current KBDI indicates a maximum KBDI value of 656 for Coryell County as of June 28, 2022; and,

WHEREAS, the KBDI value for Coryell County is now within the highest range of the index, indicating a severe drought and increased wildfire occurrence; and

WHEREAS, the Coryell County is currently under a burn ban order for the entire County; and

WHEREAS, the above conditions pose a substantial, significant, and imminent threat to persons and property in Coryell County; and

WHEREAS, Coryell County, Texas, is taking extraordinary measures to prevent the spread of the devastating fires in our communities, and to protect the fire-fighting resources within the County; therefore

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Coryell County that a state of emergency and disaster continues within Coryell County due to wildfires and extreme drought conditions; and

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED by the Court that Court Order 2022-11 be amended to add:

- 1. This order shall take effect immediately upon approval by the Commissioners Court.
- 2. That the use of any and all fireworks in Coryell County is prohibited.
- 3. That public fireworks displays, celebrating the 4th of July, may be conducted from July 2-4, 2022, provided:
 - a. The fireworks display is conducted within the city limits of an incorporated municipality of Coryell County, and

- b. The fireworks display is sanctioned by the Governing body of the municipality, and
- c. The fireworks display is conducted by a licensed and bonded fireworks/pyrotechnics vendor, and
- d. Appropriate fire response assets, as determined by the municipality, are present at the location of the fireworks display.
- 4. That this Disaster Declaration, pursuant to the provisions of Section 418.108(i)(1), Texas Government Code, shall be transmitted to the Office of the Governor with a request that this Disaster Declaration remain in full force and effect beyond 60 hours from the date of its issuance and that it be extended until such time as the Coryell County Burn Ban Order is lifted.
- 5. A person who knowingly or intentionally violates any directive legally authorized and issued by this Order commits an offense, punishable by a fine up to \$500.00.

In accordance with request from the Texas Division of Emergency Management, and the Office of General Counsel, Office of the Governor, the Texas A&M Forest Service (TAMFS) is asked to verify the following information in implementing procedures for consideration of a county's request for extension for local declaration of disaster.

- 1. County has an Average Keetch-Byram Drought Index of 575 or greater.
- 2. Fire occurrence for previous 14 days. Local Fire Department occurrences are dependent on fire departments reporting to Texas FireConnect (fireconect.tfs.tamu.edu).
- 3. Current drought intensity. Drought implies an increased availability of dead and live fuels that will contribute to combustion. Increased fuel loading will increase fire intensity, increase the rate of spread and generally increase a wildfire's resistance to control.
- 4. Burn bans are enacted at the local level, and the burn ban map is updated daily as the TAMFS is notified by local jurisdictions.
- 5. If the above criteria is not met and special circumstances are cited, provide supporting documentation if possible, to assist with validation/support of special circumstances cited.


